We are committed to fostering a strong business community that provides jobs, services and support for our community and residents.



In the Business of Connection

Welcome to Rockville, the heart of Maryland's innovation and growth!

Rockville stands out as an ideal place to live, work, and invest for a myriad of reasons. As one of the top ten most culturally diverse cities in the United States, Rockville takes pride in its A+ rated public education system and over 1,000 acres of parkland. With 65 parks featuring hiking trails, wildlife sanctuaries, public art, a swim center, and other community amenities, Rockville offers an exceptional quality of life. Located in the greater Washington D.C. metropolitan area, residents enjoy easy access to world-class museums, cultural events, and three major international airports. Rockville's rank as a No. 1 city for families by Livability. com emphasizes Rockville's appeal for residents and businesses alike. We encourage businesses, residents, and visitors to learn more about things to do and see on our tourism website: explorerockville.org.

In the post-pandemic era, Rockville has emerged as a prominent hub for life science and biotech companies, solidifying its position as the immunology capital of Maryland. Proximity to key federal agencies like National Institutes of Health and the Food and Drug Administration has made Rockville one of the top three locations for life science industries in the nation. The establishment of the Global Pandemic Prevention and Biodefense Center also underscores Rockville's role in addressing global challenges. Rockville's business landscape is thriving with a surge in new businesses and investments, including over \$400 million in IPOs, private funding, and venture capital across a variety of industries in 2023.

As Montgomery County's government seat, Rockville hosts several company headquarters, including industry leaders like Emmes, Meso Scale Diagnostics, Maxim Biomedical, ZeniMax Media Inc., Arcellx, and Westat. Companies like these benefit from Rockville's highly educated and diverse workforce, with 64% of residents holding a college degree. In 2020, Insurify named Rockville Maryland's most educated city, underlining Rockville's reputation for quality talent. Companies located in Rockville not only benefit from the city's quality workforce, but also have access to a variety of office, retail, flex and industrial spaces.

In recent years, Rockville has seen a surge in construction projects including new developments and revitalization. New construction such as the much-anticipated Twinbrook Quarter - an 18-acre, metro-adjacent, mixed-use development - is projected to open Phase 1 in the first quarter of 2025. Phase 1 of Twinbrook Quarter is anchored by an 80,000 sf Wegmans, and includes 25,000 sf of retail space and 450 apartment homes. BXP (formerly Boston Properties) acquired a 31-acre redevelopment site that will become a mixed-use project called the Shady Grove Innovation District that will include both office and multifamily space. Other projects include the repositioning of 800 King Farm and One Preserve Parkway which provide move-in-ready wet lab space.

Rockville's small businesses, retailers and restaurants can take advantage free marketing programs including Explore Rockville and Rockville Rewards. Additionally, special initiatives such as the Maryland Women's Business Center (MWBC) Shop Local retail incubator allowentrepreneurstoaccelerate their business journey. REDI is also supporting the growth of small scale manufacturing by highlighting key locations in Rock East District and throughout the City of Rockville, and by providing technical support and connections to key business resources.

about ROCKVILLE



Rockville is one of Maryland's oldest towns, with its origins dating back to pre-independence America. During Revolutionary times Rockville was known as Hungerford's Tavern, the name of its most familiar business and landmark.

When Montgomery County was formed by a division of Frederick County in 1776, Rockville served as the county seat and gradually became known as Montgomery Court House. In the 1780s, the community was known as Williamsburgh, named for the family that subdivided the central part of town, when Rockville was little more than a cluster of homes, a tavern, a courthouse and a jail.


Contemporary accounts about the Underground Railroad suggest that there was a network of people in Rockville who assisted enslaved individuals seeking freedom, placing Rockville at the center of this aspect of American history.

In 1801, the Maryland General Assembly officially established the name of the town as "Rockville" because of its proximity to Rock Creek. The population grew from 200 in 1800 to 400 in 1846. Rockville became incorporated in 1860 and was governed by three commissioners until 1888, when the city's 400 residents elected the first Mayor and Council.

Presently, Rockville is considered one of the nation's leading small cities and has earned its place among the top 20 most diverse communities in the nation. Rockville reveres its roots and its commitment to citizen-centric public service, to the environment, and to the connection of neighborhood and residents.

As an incorporated city in Montgomery County, Rockville operates as its own jurisdiction. Residents, business owners or commercial real estate investors, benefit from the City of Rockville's customer-focused planning & zoning, safety, transportation and parks & recreation departments, among other top City services.





Population by Diversity



City Attorney

The Office of the City Attorney provides legal support to the City of Rockville and serves as the legal advisor to the Mayor and Council, all boards and commissions, and city staff on all legal matters affecting the city. As legal advisor to the city, the Office of the City Attorney attends and provides legal counsel at Mayor and Council meetings, and, as needed, at meetings of the city's various boards and commissions; prepares, negotiates and/or reviews all legal documents involving the city; prepares and/or reviews ordinances, resolutions, and amendments to the City Code and Charter; and represents the city's interests in legal proceedings before federal and state courts and administrative agencies.

City Clerk/Director of Council Operations Office

The City Clerk/Director of Council Operations Office supports the Mayor & Council in carrying out their mission by providing administrative and clerical assistance. This includes attending all official meetings and legal notices of the elected body in order to prepare and manage the records of actions of the meetings, serving as liaison between Mayor & Council and the citizens of Rockville, coordinating and participating in the City's boards and commissions, providing staff support to the Board of Supervisors of Elections, Compensation Commission, and Charter Review, overseeing the City's archival records to ensure the preservation and protection of the City's historic documents, and administering a fair and impartial process for City elections.

City Manager's Office

The City Manager's Office implements the policies and priorities of the Mayor & Council, provides professional recommendations to the Mayor & Council, and oversees the day-to-day management of city operations. The City Manager's Office partners with the Mayor & Council, always striving to maintain the hometown feel that makes Rockville special.

The City Manager's Office works directly with the community to provide recommendations to the Mayor & Council, giving more input to the community members in deciding what happens in their neighborhoods. With an eye toward responsible spending, creative partnerships, and employee involvement, the City Manager's Office leads the implementation of the Mayor & Council's adopted budget and Capital Improvements Program.

Procurement Division

The Procurement Division conducts all procurement activities in an open and transparent environment, protects the integrity of the city's procurement systems, maximizes the return on investment of the city's resources in fulfilling the city's public policy objectives, surpluses excess city property, and provides equitable treatment to all persons involved in procurement activities. This Division maintains the city's minority, female, disabled, and veteran (MFD-V) business outreach program, procurement card program, and supply management training program. The Division also manages the city's stockroom, which seeks to provide supplies to all city departments while minimizing the resources invested in inventory and optimizing availability of in-demand items.

Department of Housing and Community Development

The Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) plans and implements activities that seek to increase the city's affordable housing supply and ensure fair and equitable relations between landlords, tenants, common ownership communities, and their members.

HCD strives to maintain existing housing stock in safe, habitable conditions through its Community Development Block Grant (CGBG) Rehabilitation programs, utility payment assitance to prevent utility shut offs, and rental assistance to prevent eviction. Moreover, HCD offers comprehensive and wraparound social services that include counseling and mental health services, referral services to food supply, mentoring, and other self-sufficiency programming.


